Flower Centerpieces for Daffodil Day More Centerpieces are Needed ! April 19, 2023

The Daffodils⁴Detroit committee invites all Michigan Division branches and members who attend Daffodil Day to LEND flower centerpieces – five per branch – for use at the event. Please note: After the event, the centerpieces will be taken home by those who brought them!

SPECIFICATIONS:

- 45 centerpieces will be needed.
- Centerpieces do not have to match.
- Use **simple clear glass vases** of any shape.
- Place a small ID label on the underside of the vase.
- Finished centerpieces should be no more than 14" tall and no wider than 12" in diameter.

All, or at least 50%, of the floral material should be daffodils. Feel free to be creative with the other 50%, provided daffodils are dominant.

Centerpieces may be taken to the Detroit Yacht Club during open hours on Tuesday, April 18, or they may be delivered to the DYC no later than 10:30 am on Daffodil Day, Wednesday, April 19.







Franklin Garden Club

The Franklin Garden Club's 2023 program year began with a talk by Cheryl English, an advanced master gardener and owner of *Black Cat Pottery/The English Landscape*. Cheryl astounded us with her comprehensive knowledge of native trees, shrubs and vines

and how to use them in ecological gardening. We were entertained and educated.

On February 13[,] Lindsey Pielak of *Keeping Detroit Growing* presented a tour de force about the activities of the non-profit and its growth over the past six years. Located in the *Eastern Market* area of Detroit, they have many hoop houses that extend the growing season and provide fresh produce in an area considered to be a food desert. Training people in the neighborhood to start their own community gardens is their forte and the group has made a significant improvement in the appearance of the area, as well as providing vegetables to low-income families and seniors.

All About Dahlias was the topic of our March 13 meeting lecture, presented by Lucy Propst. She is the president of the *Master Gardener Society of Oakland County* and the recording secretary of the Southeastern *Michigan Dahlia Society*. Tubers are her specialty and many of us want to learn about propagation, winter storage and enhancing bloom size.

We will take a field trip to *WOJO's Greenhouse* in Ortonville on April 10, and expect to learn about the management of a greenhouse. On May 8 we will have our Annual Business Meeting and we will also organize for our June 21 garden walk.

Indian Village Garden Club

The Indian Village Branch's January 2023 program continued from January 9 to January 16.

On the ninth, our speaker was Dwight Roston, from *Planted Detroit*, a new facility that grows greens year-round. It is located on Lafayette and Mount Elliot, near our Indian Village neighborhood. Dwight explained how they grow ultra-organic greens under lights in a controlled environment. He also brought a large sample of the salads produced at *Planted Detroit*. They were as tasty as they were healthy and enjoyed by all.

Planted Detroit was so intriguing, that we organized a field trip to the growth facility on the morning of January 16. Over a dozen Indian Village branch members and friends were able to tour the facility. Before we entered, we had to put on hairnets, foot covers, lab coats and have our hands washed by a machine.

It was fascinating to see how the plants were grown on vertical shelves, at the rate of hundreds of plants per square yard. It is what a farm would look like on a space station. The room, with ultraviolet lights used for young seedlings, was especially striking.

It was great to see such an unusual new business thriving in our area. Salads from *Planted Detroit* can be purchased at *Plum Markets* and at many *Meijers* stores. They are the salad of choice for *Henry Ford Hospital*. *Planted Detroit* delivers free to Indian Village. I am sure we will all be eating more salads.



Horticulture Therapy, A Commitment to Our Community by Cathie Gerding, co-chairperson, Saginaw Horticulture Therapy Committee

Horticulture Therapy has had a presence in the Saginaw Branch of WNF&GA for more than 60 years. In 1961, the Saginaw Branch was given the Michigan Division WNF&GA award for participation in Horticulture Therapy.

Today, our Saginaw Horticulture Therapy Committee consists of eleven members. From October through May, monthly project kits are prepared by committee members. They gather in members' homes to make sample projects and assemble project kits. The kit assembly consists of gathering materials, cutting pieces, and often painting. Committee members deliver kits or go as teams in-person to assist in making the projects at select facilities.

Until March 2020, committee members went to community facilities to work with residents or students. During the pandemic, members were unable to enter care facilities, but continued to provide project kits. The facilities for which we have provided projects during the past forty years are: The Saginaw Juvenile Detention Center, Pace Community Village Assisted Living Center, and Millet Learning Center for differently challenged students.

This year (2022-2023), we can again enter Millet Learning Center and work with the students. We deliver project kits to the Juvenile Detention Center and Pace Community Village.

Our Horticulture Therapy program continues to be recognized by every care center served. Plaques which attest to our longevity in volunteering in their facilities are numerous. Having the opportunity to visit the facilities and help participants complete the prepared crafts is truly a blessing to our members. 
