WNF&GA Annual Meetings -What We Wish We'd Known

Here are some things we wish we'd known before we went to the WNF&GA annual National Meeting in New York in 2013:

We went to our first meeting mainly because it was in New York. After four days with fellow garden club members, we were hooked. We especially appreciated that the bus fee paid for the modern bus transportation to and from the location and its use while there. Admission fees, tours and several meals were included in the registration fee. The hotel fee was separate.

We expected the business meetings to be dull. We were wrong. We discovered how important WNF&GA is. We had no clue how we all fit together – Milford, Michigan Division and National. We learned how WNF&GA helps women of the world improve the lives of their families through horticulture. We also learned how WE are an important part of that help.

The next year was the 100th (1914-2014) anniversary celebration of WNF&GA at Temple University's Ambler College in suburban Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, on the grounds of the former Pennsylvania School of Horticulture for Women. Louisa King was the WNF&GA's founder and its first president. There were 12 original members.

Milford Garden Club's flag was presented, along with flags from many other branches.

The next annual meeting we attended was held in Cincinnati in 2017. We learned things we didn't know we didn't know. We learned about the river, butterflies and information about the underground railroad. We continued developing friendships that had begun at previous meetings.

The 2018 meeting was held in the naturally beautiful Finger Lakes Region around Ithaca, New York and Cornell University. The Cornell Botanic Gardens were spectacular. (Plus the university's dairy store had great ice cream!) We learned how wine is made. Because we were returning home through Canada, we couldn't take back any plants. Bummer!

In Toronto in 2019, we visited two major botanical gardens and attended a city garden walk with more than twenty homes. There was more than a person could see on just one trip.

We don't have any idea what we will learn next, but we are looking forward to the opportunities. We encourage you to consider joining us for the next annual meeting to be held in Louisville, Kentucky from June 3 - 7, 2020. Feel free to contact one of us if you would like more information.

NOTE FROM THE EDITOR:

Expressions of gratitude were offered to eight Michigan Division branches whose members provided beautiful centerpieces for the Daffodil Day luncheon tables on April 17, 2019.

There were, in fact, **NINE** branches, not eight, whose members created D4D centerpieces. I am very sorry to have omitted one branch's name in both newsletter issues. I didn't learn about the omission until after the fall newsletter was published and - wow! - am I embarrassed! I appreciate the opportunity to set the record straight.

Thank you to the Plymouth Garden Club and to their members who provided wonderful centerpieces for Daffodil Day 2019!

Q & A with a Michigan Division branch president

Q: What do lifelong curiosity, a love of herbs and a former hippie have in common? A: Sandra Jackson, president of the Grosse Pointe Park Garden Club branch of Michigan Division.

Several months ago, during phone conversations and text exchanges with Sandra, I realized that she's a treasure trove of interesting information about the WNF&GA, garden centers, herbs and other topics. I requested that we meet so that we could talk further. An unwelcome November snowfall delayed our meeting by a week – but meet we did, on November 21, 2019, at the Red Crown, a restaurant in Grosse Pointe Park. The following Q & A is a small part of our chat.

Q: How did you first come to gardening? *A: I grew up in Wayne, Michigan, and always lived in apartments and flats. That didn't result in my developing an interest in gardening. But my father grew up on a farm in Tennessee and he was a beekeeper. That got me "into bees." I joined the Detroit Garden Center in the 1970s. I still wasn't a gardener, but I went to their programs and became especially interested in herbal vinegars. I put my toes in everything. The Herb Society of America, through the Grosse Pointe unit, opened my world and my life as a gardener, probably because of the historical significance of herbs. As of a few years ago, there were more than 50 active Herb Society of America units in the United States, but not in every state. Numbers have been shrinking, however, and now there are approximately 46 active units in the U.S.*

Q: There are elements of your post-high-school-graduation life story that make me wonder: Were you a hippie? *A: Yes, until I got a civilian job with the U.S. Navy.*

Q: Did you go to Woodstock? *A: No, but several of my friends and I were offered a last-minute invitation to go there in an RV with an acquaintance who had a handful of tickets.*

Q: What can you tell me about how the Detroit Garden Center got started? *A: It was founded by Garden Clubs of Michigan and was the third such garden center in the U.S. The first garden center was in New Jersey and the second in Cleveland. Garden centers established libraries which were open to members and non-members, and the centers were also instrumental in helping people create successful Victory Gardens.*


Q: Do you have any other special interests? A: My passion is curry and I'm very interested in the ethnobotany* of Christmas. When it comes to the history of gardens, two books are favorites: A TREASURY OF AMERICAN GARDENING, edited by John R. Whiting, 1947, 1954, 1955 and FRUITS OF VICTORY, THE WOMAN'S LAND ARMY OF AMERICA IN THE GREAT WAR, by Elaine F. Weiss, 2008. Everybody knows about Rosie the Riveter, but very few know about the Woman's Land Army.



Daffodil Day 2020

Daffodil Day will be on April 15, 2020, in the main dining room of the Detroit Yacht Club on Belle Isle. In the photo to the right is one of the beautiful 2019 centerpieces.



We invite all interested branches –

those who participated in 2018 or 2019, other branches, or a combination of the two – to provide centerpieces again on April 15, 2020. It's not too early to sign up by emailing MI DIV advisor Mary Schwark: schwark@aol.com

SPECIFICATIONS REMINDER:

- Use simple clear glass vases of any shape.
- Finished centerpieces do not have to match.
- Finished centerpieces must be no more than 14" tall and no more than 12" wide.
- Place a small ID label on the vase underside.

At least 50%, of the floral material should be daffodils. You may be creative with the other 50%, provided daffodils are dominant.

NOTE: The centerpieces will again be "loaners." Take them to the DYC on Belle Isle and then take them home to enjoy. Deliver the centerpieces on April 14, the day prior to the event, or by 10:30 am on April 15.
