Update on 2021 Planting

Have you ever seen the bulb planting machine in action? This year, it made fast work of the 120,000 Dutch Master bulbs which were purchased with proceeds from the 2021 virtual Daffodil Luncheon.

On average and in good soil, the equipment, purchased from The Netherlands and shown below, can plant 30,000 bulbs per day. During the fall of 2021, the City of Detroit planted the bulbs on both Belle Isle and in the medians and parks of the city.

Special visitors Mary and Bill Schwark (photo below) made an extra donation to observe the planter in action on Daffodil Hill in late October 2021.

In addition, the MDNR donated 12,500 bulbs for planting along the new Iron Belle Trail on Belle Isle.



From your Michigan Division co-presidents ...

Happy New Year, everyone!

With 2021 behind us, we look forward to socializing more normally. Plans are already moving along for an inperson Daffodil Day luncheon on Wednesday, April 20, 2022. Our Spring Council Meeting date and location are still to be determined.

Speaking of Daffodil Day . . .

As Michigan Division co-presidents, we participate on the committee which plans the annual daffodil fundraising luncheon at Belle Isle's Detroit Yacht Club. (See the dropdown tab in the Michigan Division website for photos of past luncheons.) In October 2009, Cecily O'Connor, Bloomfield Hills Branch, organized a Detroit Yacht Club luncheon with Lynden Miller as speaker. Lynden spoke about the Daffodil Project in Manhattan, and an idea was born. In April 2010, Claudia Scioly organized the first Daffodil Day luncheon. Robin Heller, a member of the Grosse Pointe Farm & Garden Club, and also a member of the DYC, has now chaired the Daffodils4Detroit (D4D) committee since 2014. Please see important information from Robin on pages 1 and 14 of this newsletter.

Just over three years ago, D4D fulfilled its initial pledge to plant 650,000 daffodil bulbs on Belle Isle – one for each resident of the City of Detroit. Bulb planting has taken place under the direction of Barry Burton, project manager, General Services Department, Landscape Design Unit, City of Detroit. Perhaps you saw the results of Barry's work in the narrated slide show which he presented during our virtual 2021 Daffodil Day event.

The success of our partnership with Detroit inspired an expanded effort into the tri-county area for a total goal of four million bulbs, once the project is complete. As of fall 2021, 2.75 million bulbs had been planted. How you can help: We encourage each branch to contribute \$100 or more as you plan your donations for 2022. Each \$100 will

purchase 500 bulbs. If we all pitch in – individuals, branches, local businesses, friends and neighbors – we can raise funds for the remaining bulbs. Please put on your benevolent thinking caps.

Other Michigan Division board projects: (1) One of our primary concerns in early 2022 is to bring onboard a volunteer webmaster to learn from current longtime MI DIV webmaster Sally Edwards, Rochester Branch. The new person will eventually take on full webmaster responsibility. Please help with the search by sharing your suggestions – possibly your own branch's webmaster? (2) We have completed two out of three Presidents' Gatherings. We will complete the third and last gathering in the spring of 2022. It will bring together branch presidents, or their representatives, from our

Projects included in the plan were generated by the board of directors, as well as by those who attended our Presidents' Gatherings. We will share the plan with you in our spring newsletter. Editor's note:

Below are two recipes from Grosse Pointe Shores Garden Club member Diane Karwowski. While the Michigan Division newsletter rarely features recipes, as one of those who enjoyed Diana's spectacular lunch in early November 2021, I would feel selfish for not sharing with you the recipes that she so generously shared with her guests. Thank you, Diana!

Sweet Potato & Apple Casserole . . . from Diana Karwowski
Prep: 20 min Cook: 50 min Serves: 6
An easy casserole – the perfect combination of sweet & savory!

INGREDIENTS:

4 sweet potatoes (about 2 ½ lbs.) peeled & cut into 1" dice 4 small apples (or 3 large) – peeled, cored & cut into 1" pieces

½ cup unsalted butter, melted ½ cup dark brown sugar ¼ cup maple syrup 2 tsps. pumpkin pie spice ¼ cup pecans, chopped

salt to taste

DIRECTIONS:

Add potatoes to a large pot. Cover with water. Bring to a boil over high heat & cook until the potatoes *just start to soften*. They will continue cooking during subsequent baking.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F, and spray a 9"x13" casserole dish with nonstick spray. Drain the potatoes and place them in the prepared baking dish. Add the apples.

In a small bowl, mix the melted butter, brown sugar, maple syrup and pumpkin pie spice. Pour mixture over the apples and potatoes and stir to combine.

Place in oven and bake for 25 minutes. Remove from oven & top with pecans. Return to oven and bake for 5 minutes more to toast the pecans.

RECIPE NOTES:

Root vegetables: Sweet potatoes can be replaced by or combined with other root vegetables such as turnips or parsnips.

To Make Ahead:

Prepare casserole as directed and cover tightly before refrigerating up to 48 hours. Remove from the refrigerator at least 30 minutes before baking. Bake as directed.



½ cup crushed croutons

1/4 cup chopped pecans

1 package (3 oz.) cream cheese with chives

2 tbsp. butter, softened

½ tsp. lemon pepper seasoning

2 cups cooked white chicken

1/3 cup (2 oz.) drained mushroom pieces, chopped

1 can crescent rolls (Pillsbury are best.)

3 tbsp. butter, melted

Sauce: canned chicken gravy (1 - 2 tbsp. chives) added)

DIRECTIONS:

In a small bowl, combine crushed croutons & nuts. Set aside.

In medium mixing bowl, combine cream cheese, 2 tbsp. soft butter and lemon pepper seasoning. Mix.

Stir in chicken and mushrooms. Set aside.

Separate triangles of dough. Spread each with about ½ cup chicken mixture. Roll up into a ball. (It works!)

Dip rolls in melted butter and coat each with crumbnut mixture.

Place on ungreased cookie sheet in a 375 degree F oven. Bake for 15-20 minutes until golden brown.

Serve with warm chicken gravy.

DIANA'S NOTES: She used Kroger Seasoned Herb Croutons. To the canned chicken gravy, Diana added some dry white wine, fresh thyme, pepper and a dash of salt. She used parchment paper under the crescents to prevent burning.

Flower Centerpieces for Daffodil Day April 20, 2022

The Daffodils4Detroit committee invites all Michigan Division branches and members who attend Daffodil Day to LEND flower centerpieces – five per branch – for use at the event. Please note: Following the event, the centerpieces will be taken home by those who brought them!

SPECIFICATIONS:

- 45 centerpieces will be needed.
- Centerpieces do not have to match.
- Use simple clear glass vases of any shape.
- Place a small ID label on the underside of the vase.
- Finished centerpieces should be no more than 14" tall and no wider than 12" in diameter.

All, or at least 50%, of the floral material should be daffodils. Feel free to be creative with the other 50%, provided daffodils are dominant.

Centerpieces may be taken to the Detroit Yacht Club during open hours on Tuesday, April 19, or they may be delivered to the DYC no later than 10:30 am on Daffodil Day, Wednesday, April 20.



In partnership with the *Plymouth Downtown Authority*, the Plymouth Garden Club was asked to enhance the sculpture by planting and maintaining a selection of perennials and annuals. April 27, 2010 - 1st Daffodil Luncheon organized at the DYC by Claudia Scioly, AA branch (tkts: \$25 WNFGA members; \$35 guests)

2012 Luncheon Notables – (a) Aislinn Scofield creates the signature image/notecard using the Lady Bird Johnson quote, "Where flowers bloom, so does hope." The notecard was distributed as a luncheon favor. (b) Daffodil Project announces the vision of celebrating each life in the Detroit region by planting 4,000,000 bulbs.

2012 Michigan Division Council Meeting – Michigan Division approves Daffodil Project as a Division project beginning in 2013.

2017 Luncheon Notables – (a) Introduction of **Daffodils4Detroit** name and steps for planting expansion from Belle Isle into Detroit (b) City of Detroit proclamation – envisioned and shepherded through the process by Michigan Division member and former president Sheila Kneeshaw – that the third Wednesday in April would be Detroit Daffodil Day (c) D4D receives Spirit of Detroit award from the City of Detroit.

September 2017 - D4D receives the President's Award, Keep Michigan Beautiful's highest award.

April 25, 2018 – City of Detroit announces goal to plant 1,000,000 daffodils in the city by 2020.

Fall 2018 - D4D reaches goal of 650,000 bulbs planted on Belle Isle, representing one bulb for each City of Detroit resident.

2019 – 10th annual Daffodil Day luncheon

2020 – In-person luncheon was cancelled due to the pandemic; donations were accepted.

2021 - Committee holds VIRTUAL Daffodil Day due to pandemic; donations were accepted.
